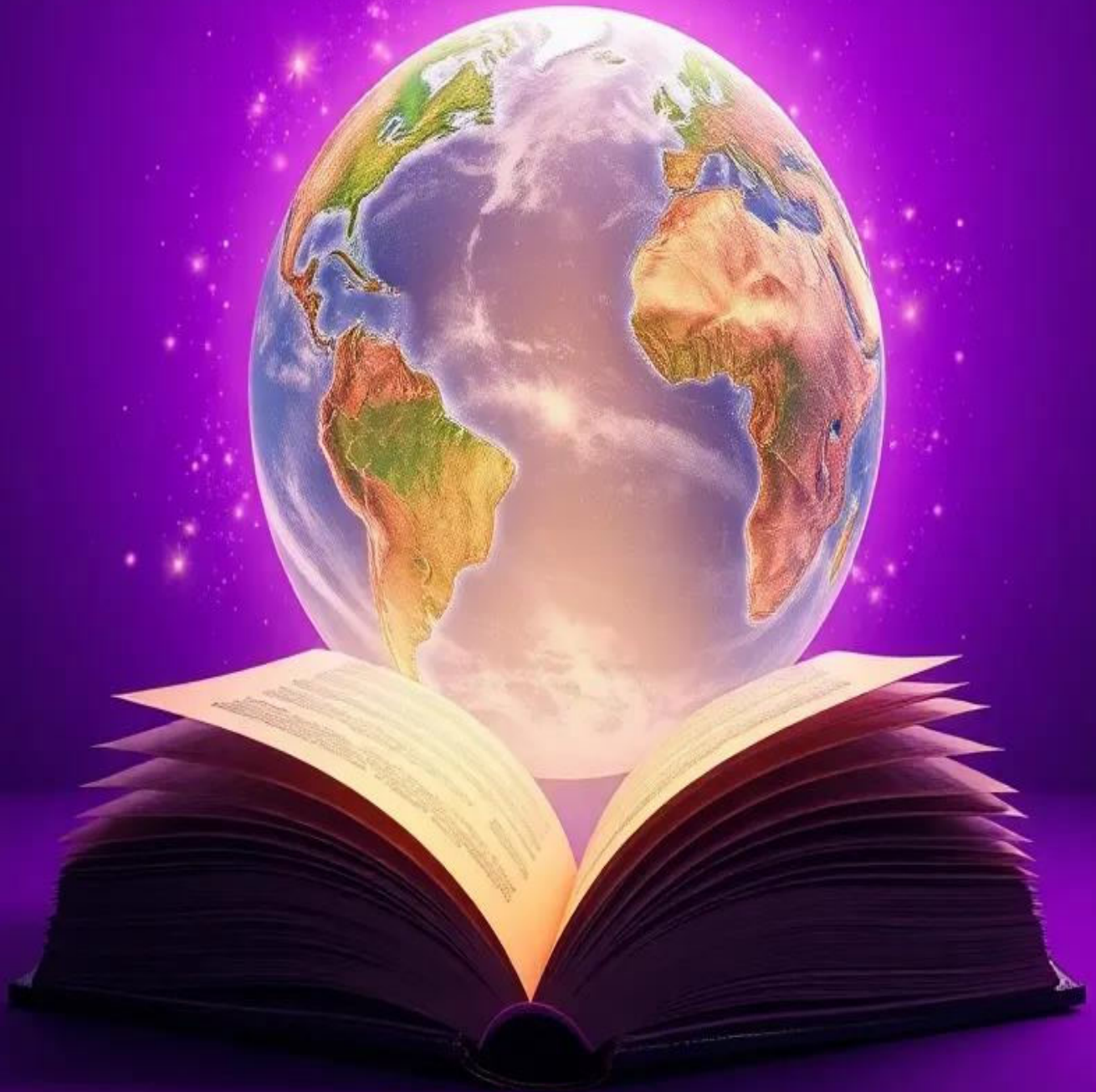

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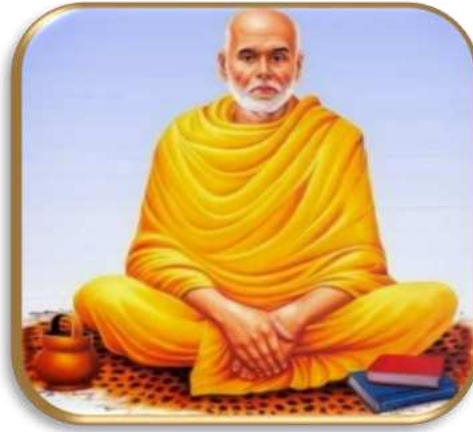
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Sree Narayana Guru (1854-1928)

Two-Week Faculty Development Program on MOOCs:

From December 13 to December 27, 2021, our college successfully conducted a two-week Faculty Development Program (FDP) on MOOCs in collaboration with Ramanujan College, University of Delhi. This initiative aimed to enhance the understanding and implementation of Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) among educators.



The program attracted a total of 299 participants, including 25 faculty members from our institution, along with educators from various colleges across India. The FDP covered a range of topics related to the design, development, and delivery of MOOCs, providing participants with valuable insights and practical skills to enhance their teaching methodologies.

This collaborative effort underscores our commitment to professional development and our dedication to embracing innovative teaching practices in higher education. The positive feedback from participants highlighted the program's impact on their understanding of online learning and its potential to enrich the educational experience for students.

Computer Labs Inventory:

The College is dedicated to supporting the technological needs of students and faculty through well-equipped computer labs located on different floors. These labs are essential for practical sessions, research, and academic activities, ensuring access to modern computing facilities that enhance both learning and teaching experiences.

College Library & Development Resource Generation:

The library provides a comprehensive collection of reference and textbooks, CD ROMs, and access to the N-LIST portal for e-books and e-journals. It continually updates its resources based on user needs and offers a range of newspapers, magazines, and journals. The library is equipped with 28 computers, all with LAN and Internet connectivity for student and faculty use, while adhering to COVID-19 protocols during the second wave.

The Library Committee organized a Webinar on Reading Day and an Essay competition on “Problems Faced by Women Entrepreneurs.”. The Committee also conducted Library Audit in December.

The College features an incubation centre within the library, equipped with 26 state-of-the-art computers that provide LAN and internet connectivity, facilitating project and research work for both students and faculty.

This report reflects the library's ongoing commitment to enhancing academic resources and promoting literacy and research among students and faculty.

Conduct of Examinations:

All examinations at the College were conducted on time, adhering to the guidelines set by the University of Mumbai. Utilizing robust online platforms, examinations were seamlessly administered, enabling students to showcase their knowledge from the comfort of their homes. To uphold the integrity and fairness of the process, rigorous proctoring measures and strict adherence to academic regulations were implemented.



Sports & Games:

The academic year 2021-22 kicked off with the formation of teams for various sports, including Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Volleyball, Box Cricket, Football, and indoor games like Chess and Carom. The Committee's efforts successfully benefited a substantial number of participants, significantly contributing to the holistic development and well-being of the students.

The Inter-Class Sports Event took place on March 7-8, 2022, with 340 students competing in Box Cricket, Basketball, Football, and Volleyball.

Participation in Inter-College Tournaments: During the year, our students participated in several Inter-Collegiate Sports Tournaments in Mumbai, achieving impressive results.

“Oasis” Inter-Collegiate Sports Event took place on February 7-8, 2022, with **1200 plus students** from **46 colleges** competing in **8 events**. This vibrant event showcased talent and fostered sportsmanship among participants.

The Annual Sports Meet was held on February 18, 2022, featuring ten events. A total of 512 students participated, making it a truly memorable occasion.

Overall, the sports committee facilitated a dynamic year of athletic participation, showcasing our students' talents and commitment.

Cultural Committee Highlights:

Cultural activities are essential to college life, fostering personal development and enriching the learning experience. Under the guidance of Miss Rishita Shukla, the Cultural Committee organized a variety of engaging events throughout the year. Key activities were:

1. **Three days Fun Events** from 26th July to 28th July, 2021. Total 1,663 students from various colleges across Mumbai participated.
2. **75th Independence Day Celebration** on August 15, 2021 in hybrid mode. There were more than 3,000 viewers on YouTube with over 250 participants on Zoom.

3. Commencement of Academic Year and Welcoming New Students: The Academic year commenced from 14th June, 2021 as per the Government Circular guidelines. The lectures were conducted online for S.Y.J.C students of Commerce and Science. An orientation programme was arranged online on 21st August, 2021, for newly admitted FYJC students.

Financial Aid: College helped students to get all eligible free ship and scholarship from Govt. departments as well as from Private Trusts.

Report of One Day International Seminar**On****“Resilience and Reinvention of Global Economy in the Context of Covid 19: A Multidisciplinary Approach”**

Rules of Personal Finance.

1. Rule of 72

This rule is used to calculate the time in which your investment will double in value. Just divide 72 by your annual ROI.

2. Rule of 70.

This rule states that if we keep the money in cash and not invest it on time your money will get reduces to half of its present value. Just divide 70 with the inflation rate (CPI)

3.50-30-20 Rule

This rule tells you how you should spend your money. Spend your income in the following proportions. 50% on needs ,30% on wants,20% on savings

4. 3X Emergency Rule.

Always put at least 3 times your monthly income in emergency reserve.

5. Rule of 20/4/10

Put 20% of the vehicle down in cash, with a loan of 4 years or less, with a monthly payment that is less than 10% of your monthly income.

6. Rule of 70/20/10

Every month a person should spend only 70% of the money they earn, save 20%, and then they would donate 10%.

7. Rule of 30%

Spend less than 30% of your income on housing.

8. Rule of 10 second.

Whenever you're tempted to splurge on something cheap, simply hold it in your hand for 10 second & ask yourself honestly whether you need it or not.

9. 30-day rule.

Wait 30 days before you make a purchase of a "want "above a certain amount. If you still want it after waiting & you afford it,then buy it.

10. Rule of 4%

14. To estimate the actual cost of owning a car over 5 years double the price tag & divide that by 60.

1. Circle of Competence

2. First Principles Thinking

Compounding is the process by which we add interest to a fixed sum, which then earns interest on the previous sum and the newly added interest, and then earns interest on that amount, and so on ad infinitum. It is an exponential effect, rather than a linear, or additive, effect. Money is not the only thing that compounds; ideas and relationships do as well.

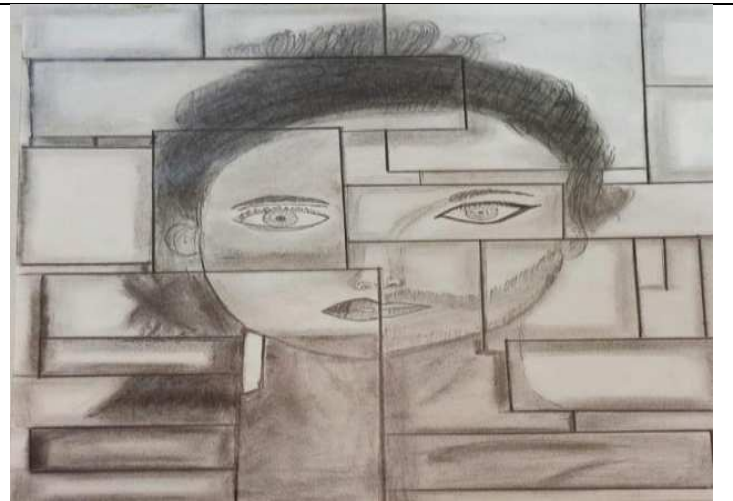

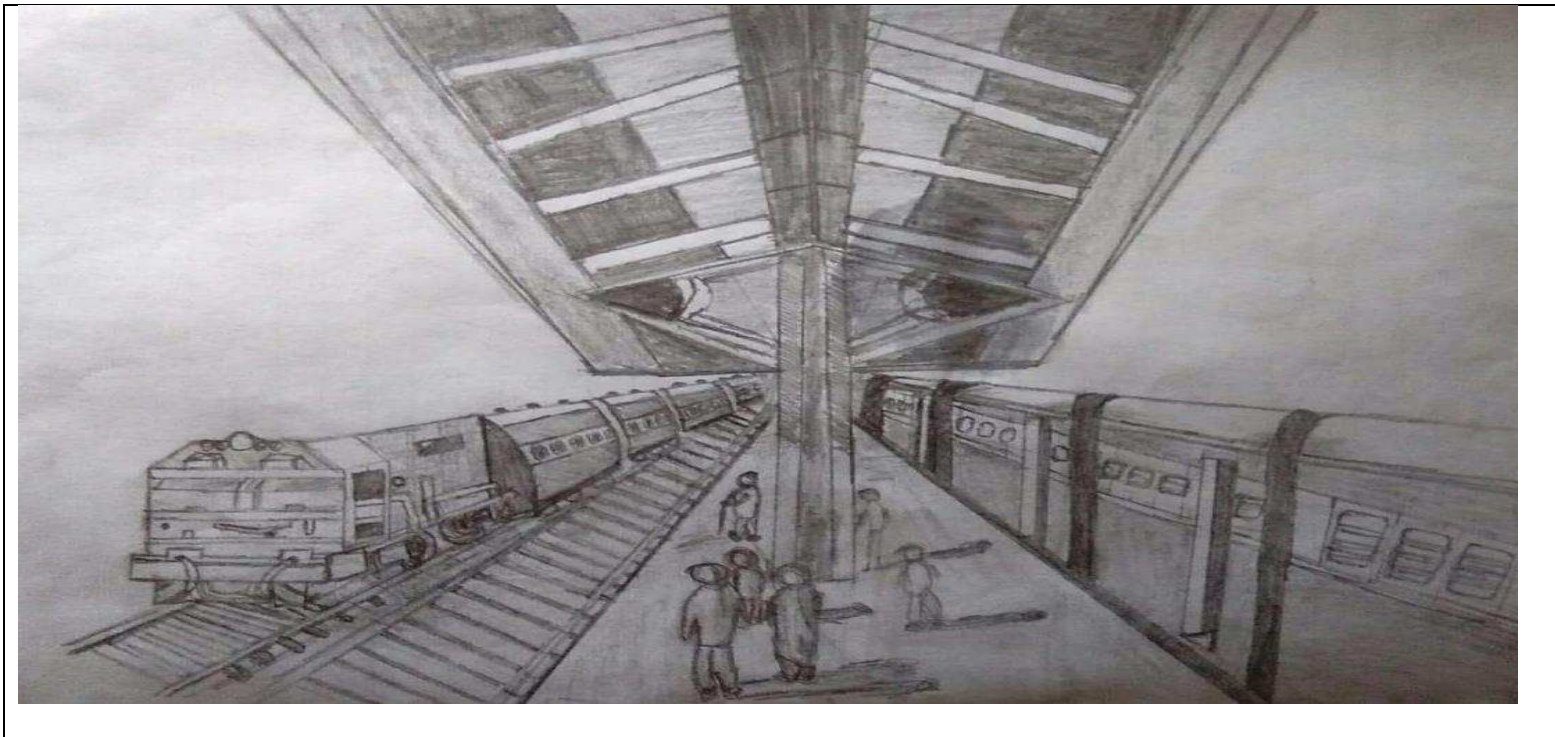
